Term Planner

Numeracy

Balaklava Primary School has a focus on numeracy. We are using the 'Big Ideas In Number' to help develop our skills. That involves four sections – 'trusting the count, place value, multiplicative thinking and partitioning'. Classes have a structured math agreement which includes playing games to practice skills. In the newsletter, and on our website, you will find information about each section and some resources you can download and use at home.

Trusting the count.

The first step is 'trusting the count'. This means that each object counted must be given one number name.

For example:

$$\begin{array}{l} 1 \text{ } \begin{array}{c} \text{☺} \\ \text{☺} \end{array} \text{ (One face)} \\ 2 = \begin{array}{c} \text{☺} \text{ ☺} \\ \text{☺} \end{array} \text{ (Two faces)} \\ 3 = \begin{array}{c} \text{☺} \text{ ☺} \text{ ☺} \\ \text{☺} \end{array} \text{ (Three faces)} \end{array}$$

Students need to recognise that "three" means a collection of three whatever it looks like. For example 3 eggs, 3 chickens or 3 blocks.

Students need to be reading, writing and using the words and numerals for the numbers 0-9, recognising small collections without counting (subitising) – more information will be in the next newsletter on this. Being able to name numbers in terms of their parts (part-part-whole) – more information will be in coming newsletters.

Activities for you to try at home

- Play with blocks – can you please find 4 yellow blocks? 3 red blocks? etc
- Make 5 sand castles in the sand pit. Write the number 5 in sand.
- Draw on a whiteboard 7 bears and write the number 7 as a numeral and in words.
- Count using pop sticks groups of 10. Then count in 10's. 10, 20, 30 etc
- Play Dominoes

Governing Council

The Governing Council (GC) is an elected group of parents and staff that oversee the management and well-being of the school community and its assets. Members of Council are elected at the Annual General Meeting and usually serve a two-year term. The tasks of GC include :

- Keeping informed about the site Learning Plan
- Advising the Principal of general community concerns and opinions
- Discussing educational policy
- Liaison with staff

The Governing Council meet in the evenings, twice per term.

Sub Committees have been formed to help share the responsibilities and decision-making with a greater number of parents who are not members of the GC. Usually, one member of each committee is also a member of GC. They then report back to the GC with any recommendations made by the committee, for the GC to vote on if necessary.

Please come along to the Governing Council AGM on Monday 2nd March to hear more, ask questions or join any of these committees. A nomination form can be found in this newsletter. We would love to see some new faces join our committees. If you have any questions prior to the meeting, please do not hesitate to contact the school, or speak with Steve Williams (Chair) or Skye Colley (Secretary).

Sub committees include:

Fundraising:

Meets on a regular basis throughout the year to initiate, implement and support various fundraising activities throughout the year. these are usual day time meetings

Finance:

Manages the school finances in consultation with the school community by developing an annual budget and monitoring expenditure and income throughout the year.

The Finance Committee meet twice per term, usually in the early evening, however the members of the committee will discuss their availability to determine a suitable meeting time in 2020.

Canteen:

Representatives from the Primary School meet with representatives from the High School to oversee the management of the canteen, usually once per term. This is often an after school meeting.

Bus:

Review of bus routes, manages the bus policies and responds to other issues concerning the school buses as they arise. This committee meets once per term, at approximately 5:15pm.

Grounds and Facilities:

The general maintenance of the school grounds and buildings, including organising working bees and ensuring the school maintenance schedule is adhered to. This committee meet twice per term, usually around 5:30pm.

PCC

The Parent Coordinating Committee (PCC) are a group that promotes a closer relationship between school and home by:

- Holding open parent meetings twice a term which includes a report from Leadership with a current up date regarding the school.
- Offering general information to parents
- Providing a morning tea to welcome new families to the school on the first morning of the year
- Organising class representatives
- Presenting graduation gifts to the year 7 students at the end of the year
- Overseeing the sale of second-hand uniforms
- Raising any issues of concern or suggestions and taking them to Governing Council
- Providing assistance at Sports events, school photo day and other school events or activities as negotiated with staff.

PCC meetings are held during the day. As we are child friendly, we welcome younger children to our meetings.

Swimming Carnival Notes

- R-2 students to arrive at school in their uniform. They will change into bathers at school.
- T-shirts / Rashi may only be removed to swim in championship events
- Students will return to school to eat their lunch and will remain at school in the afternoon.
- The school canteen is not open to Primary School students on Swimming Carnival day.
- Parents are asked to bring a chair and your own food supplies as the pool canteen will not be open.
- If you wish to take your child home from the carnival, you must sign them out. Please speak with their teacher to sign them out - sign out sheets to be located near the canteen.
- School students are the responsibility of the school staff throughout the carnival and are expected to remain with their class/House Team. Please understand that students are not allowed to stay with families unless you are signing them out and they are then officially no longer a part of the Carnival and are your responsibility.
- Students not taking part in the Swimming Carnival will be supervised at school for the day. Students who are showing poor sportsmanship will also be taken back to school and a parent will be contacted

to collect their child. If your child is not participating in the day, then parents may decide to keep their child at home. Please notify us ASAP of their absence.

Children's University

2019 was the first year of BPS involvement with the Children's University Program. As it was our first year we only opened participation to our year five, six and seven students and limited the number of passports so that we could become familiar with the program. In 2020 we are opening the program to all of our students who are interested.

What is Children's University (CUA)?

"CUA aims to encourage high quality out of school hours activities for children aged between 5 and 14 years, engaging the wider community as learning partners in this process. The most important principles of CUA are that participation is voluntary and activities must take place outside the normal school day; during lunch, after school, weekends and holidays. CUA is not compulsory and the children choose what to do and when, and the learning always has a link to something they could do at a 'grown up' university."

Students are supplied with a passport that they take to learning destinations or complete online activities and have them signed off at school. After 30 hours of learning the students are rewarded with certificates at a graduation ceremony held at the Adelaide University. The annual fee for 2020 is \$16.50 and this includes their passport.


TECHNOLOGY

Students in years 3-7 have been creating a class Kahoot. Students have made up one truth and three lies and an accompanying image. Once all student kahoots are in for each class, students will get to verse each other and see how much they know about their classmates!



Students are also making introduction videos for their class. They are first learning the processes in which to make a clip (script, props, storyboarding, camera angles) and then they are going to work in groups to each make their own snippet.

Students in junior primary have been learning how to use the camera footage on the iPads and how to program robots. They have been working out ways to plan a pathway for a robot as well as how to code.

Premier's Reading Challenge

All students have been issued with their PRC forms and teachers have been encouraging students to start reading. This year we are asking that the students speak with their teachers/SSOs about the book they have read, or complete a short book review before the book is signed off. The Challenge, reading 12 books, must be completed by 4th Sept (Wk 7 Term 3).

All students who complete the challenge will participate in a school based reward in term 4 and receive a certificate or medal depending on the number of years they have completed the challenge.

Last year BPS achieved our highest percentage of students finishing since our school enrolled in the challenge. With a percentage of 94.76 % of students completing the PRC last year we need to start reading early if we wish to better this high percentage.

PREMIER'S READING Challenge

Encourage your child to not only start early but pace themselves by reading at least 4 books each term. Rec to Yr 2 students read the books with the red PRC stickers, Yr 3-5 the green stickers and Yr 6/7 the yellow stickers. The students must read 8 PRC levelled books and then 4 of their choice; but these also need to be at their reading level. We want everyone to be able to achieve as long as they put in the effort. Students who find reading challenging may negotiate the chosen books with their teacher. More information can be found on the PRC website or come in for a chat.

An Afternoon With Rebeca Sullivan

Rebeca Sullivan an old scholar of BHS (94-98) and now strides the world stage.

We are very lucky to have her speak at the Community Library on Friday February 21st at 1.30 pm.

Recently featured in the Producer as a finalist in the SA 2020 AgriFutures Rural Women's Award, Rebeca founded Australian Native wellbeing brand Warndu with her partner Damien at Armagh.

Their Cookbook, Warndu Mai meaning good food, features sumptuous recipes using native food ingredients and was released in 2019 and is shortlisted as Booktopia's non-fiction Book of the Year.

Rebeca is a presenter on Love to Share on the TEN Network in Australia, is guest presenter on ABC Gardening Australia, has appeared regularly on Channel TEN's The Circle and Breakfast Shows, as well as Channel Nine's Morning and TODAY show.
