What a start we have had to the 2022 school year. In many ways it is hard to believe that it is already

the start of Week 6. As this is our

first newsletter for this year, I wanted to reflect upon the hybrid start to the year.

Wednesday 2nd February we welcomed to school our Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 students from Ber 2 along with students who were not able to be adequately supervised at home due to parent commitments. The staggered start allowed for our youngest members of school to gain confidence moving ground the school in what felt for them like a very safe and secure environment as there were a lot less students to contend with.

For the remainder of year 2 – 6 students, the journey of online learning began (again). This time round, staff had agreed to use Microsoft Teams and deliver several live lessons through the day. This gave students multiple opportunities to interact with their teacher and peers.

Online learning is a challenge at the best of times, however, starting the year with a brand new group of students and students with, in most cases, a new teacher is even more challenging. I am so very proud of the way that the staff, students and families embraced the challenge and made the most of every opportunity.

To support our students, we once again loaned ipads and internet dongles to students. These were collected at registration days, sent out via the School bus and home deliveries were made. By loaning devices we ensured each student had access to the technology required to log in from where ever they were learning.

After two weeks of the hybrid model, we were very excited to welcome ALL students back on Monday February 14th.



It has been fantastic to see classrooms full and the yard buzzing with excitment. Everyone has quickly settled into routine. Students have been interacting with peers, creating new friendships and working together to develop class expectations. These structures, routines and relationships are vital in setting up a successful year of learning.



We have welcomed 264 students into our classrooms this year. We would like to extend a warm welcome to our new students, their families and new staff members Sophie Griffiths, Simone Garrard and Sandy Hodgetts. We look forward to continuing to get to know these new members of our BPS community.

Newsletter -Late last year, we farewelled Zac who had been our newsletter editor for the last two vears. Diane and I took over the role of production which resulted in the newsletters being sent on different days depending on how many other commitments were taking place during newsletter week. Absences •

If a child is going to be absent for a week or more (eg planned holiday) you must apply for an Exemption prior to this taking place. Please contact the office for more information.

If your child is absent for three consecutive days for a medical condition or illness (not related to COVID), you are required to provide a medical certificate.

School Start Time

Student safety is extremely important.

Teaching staff begin yard duty (duty of care) at 8:25am each morning.



It is important that students are not at school prior to 8:25am.

If your work commitments require you to drop your children off prior to 8:25am, you will need to make arrangements with Balaklava Community Children's Centre – Out of School Hours Care service.

Illness •

It's vitally important that you please keep your child/ren home if they are:

- unwell
- experiencing any COVID-19 symptoms
- any other member of the household has COVID-19
- they are a close contact for a person who has COVID-19 and are required to quarantine

Please notify us *asap* if your child/ren tests positive for COVID-19.

If a student develops symptoms throughout the day, we will be making contact and asking for the student to be collected from School ASAP.



We need your help to ensure we are minimising the spread of illness through the school. For non Covid related illness, students need to stay home from school for a minimum of 24 hours after their last symptom. However, we appeal to you and strongly encourage you to keep your children home for at least 48 hours after their last symptom to ensure they are completely healthy upon return.

Thank you for continuing to follow this SA Health, Department for Education and BPS directive.

UPDATE

Thank you to our school community for your continued support with the Covid restrictions. A range of restrictions were removed from the start of Week 5. It is intended that these arrangements will apply until the end of Week 8, Term 1.

QR check in is no longer required.

- Day excursions permitted (indoors and outdoors) and incursions (held outdoors where possible).
 Some excursion venues may have vaccination requirements.
- Swimming lessons and sports days (spectators may attend if held outside)
- Interschool sporting competitions.

- Extra-curricular activities at the school, including choirs, band practice, instrumental lessons attended by a non-school employed music teacher.
- Work experience and work placements.
- Assemblies that are held outdoors.
- Staff are encouraged to continue to do online meetings and professional development where possible.
- In person professional development can occur in small groups, with participants wearing masks and social distancing.

Restrictions that have remained in place include:

- Parents not coming onto the site to drop students off / pick up.
- Phoning to make an appointment to see a teacher.
- Phoning before entering the office.
- Masks to be worn by all adults on the site (unless a medical exemption applies).



Term 1 Events

Many of our events were put on hold or postponed.

- Welcome Night while we wont be holding our traditional welcome night, we are working on an alternative way to deliver the information that you would normally receive on the night.
- Swimming Lessons: due to a shortage of swimming instructors, swimming lessons and the Swimming Carnival have been moved to Term 4.
- Year 6 camp: We are still negotiating a new date.
- Community Assemblies: will resume online in Week 6. If you would like to be sent the link to join our Online Assembly (via Webex) please use the Skoolbag EForm to request the link is sent to your email.
- Govering Council AGM Webex (online) meeting.
- PCC AGM Webex meeting.

All other events are planned to go ahead as scheduled and previously advised (eg Year 4/5 camp). Sports Day will be held in Term 3 just prior to SAPSASA Athletics.

Classroom Contact

What's a 'classroom' contact?

If your child is in an education setting (school, preschool, childcare, OSHC) and someone in their room, class or bus tests positive to COVID-19, they will be deemed a 'classroom contact.' Parents/carers will be notified ASAP. At BPS, we will use an automated text message and also send you a Skoolbag message with further information.

What does this mean for families?

If your child doesn't have any symptoms, they can continue to attend school, preschool, childcare as normal - they should avoid attending OSHC.

If your child has any COVID symptoms, keep them at home and get a PCR test.

If your child tests positive for COVID-19, let your school, preschool or childcare know as soon as possible and your family will need to follow instructions from SA Health.

What's a 1:1 close contact?

In some cases, children or students may be deemed a 1:1 close contact if they were helped by a teacher or SSO who tested positive for COVID-19 for more than 15 minutes, indoors, in close proximity and masks weren't worn.

1:1 close contacts will need to do 7 days of rapid antigen testing, and must get a negative result before attending school, preschool or childcare each morning. If they are unable to test, they must quarantine for 7 days.

If a student is a close contact from outside of an education setting, you must follow the SA Health Close Contact advice. Students who fall into this category cannot attend school during the isolation / quarantine period.

Our Learning SA Continued learning between school and home

Learning at Home Lessons

A suite of online lessons is available to support students who need to learn from home due to quarantine requirements, testing positive for COVID-19, or if their parents choose to keep them home while awaiting vaccination / other medical reasons.

Reception to year 10 students can access a minimum of 3 Learning at Home lessons online each day. Lessons are delivered via video or Microsoft PowerPoint and can be accessed on any device.



ICT support for parents

The Parent ICT Helpline will continue to be available to assist parents and carers if students are accessing the learning resources on Our Learning SA. Parents can call 1800 271 211, 8.30am to 4.30pm, Monday to Friday.

Canteen

Please be reminded that students are not permitted to purchase food from the canteen throughout the school day. All food must be pre-ordered either via a lunch bag or the QKR app (app cut off is 9am on the day of the lunch order)

School entry reminder =

Please be reminded that students cannot enter the school from the Balaklava High School Tech lane or from either end of the Bus Road.

Smoking near Entry / Exits =

Can I please ask you to be considerate of others and not smoke at the entry / exit gates. Thank you

Parking along Wallace Street

Please refrain from parking along the stretch of Wallace Street between the bus road and the crossing (School side) at school pick up and drop off.

Allergy Aware School =

Many children have allergies and if exposed, allergic reactions can include hives, swollen eyes, wheezing and asthma symptoms. A few reactions however can be life threatening. Some children are severely allergic to food products such as nuts.

It is our responsibility at BPS to ensure we are providing a safe environment for all students to ensure we are not exposing any students or staff members to something that is going to be a health risk.

We are seeking the support and cooperation of all families to minimise the risk of a student coming into contact with harmful foods (peanuts, sesame and linseed etc.)

While we recognise that many students enjoy Peanut Butter and Nutella and may enjoy nuts as part of a healthy diet, we ask that you include these foods in your child's diet before or after school only.



In our experience, a child who is told they can no longer have Peanut Butter or Nutella at school because it can put another child at risk will respect that and will learn to enjoy an alternative for lunch. If you are experiencing difficulty with finding alternative foods for your child, please contact the school.

Our Nut Aware policy is included in this newsletter. Thank you for working with us and recognising the need for ongoing vigilance in minimising the risk.

School Drop off / Pick Up =

While we understand that its not ideal for many parents and students that the restrictions remain in place regarding families not coming on site to walk their child/ren to the classrooms, we appreciate your continued support.

We do ask that you please consider the students when waiting at the Crossing entry / exit. As our students approach the exit they can become quite distressed when looking at a sea of parents. Please refrain from waiting at or blocking the entry / exit so that students can feel confident standing at the edge of the school looking for their parent. The independence that is developing from this challenge is is a fantastic lifelong skill.



Bike Track

In the weeks after school finished last year a bike track was laid around the school oval and incorporating the bus road, makes a loop of approximately 400m. The track was given a work out each day in the first 2 weeks by the children on site as part of their PE time.

We have recently purchased additional helmets so that between 12 – 15 bikes can be used at once. All that is required are appropriate road signs and installing our mini Silent Cop, that was constructed by the local Mens Shed, and is to be placed in the roundabout behind the Ninja course, and we will have a multipurpose fitness and road safety activity for all to use.



Ride 2 School Day =

For Friday the 25th of March we will be putting a program together for the National Ride2School day. It is a good opportunity for students within the town to brush off the cobwebs on their bikes and scooters and ride to school. Of course, walking is another way of keeping active and, as last year, we will be positioning staff at assembly points near the school for children to meet and ride/scoot/walk together to school.

Once at school, fruit boxes and a Ride2School sticker will be given to those who have been physically active on the morning, bus children included. We intend to have a bike/scooter activity in either class or year level groups during the day. If children who come by bus wish to have their bike or scooter dropped off at school or meet a group at an assembly point around town they are most welcome. We now have an assortment of donated bikes at school that can be used on the day as a backup for many of our bus children if they cannot get to use their own bike. We now have enough helmets for our own bikes as well.

More information will be going home in a note prior to the day outlining the program of activities and our assembly points around the town.

Club Breakfast has resumed for 2022. Breakfast is available in the each library day between 8:25am 8:45am. All students are welcome.

Breakfast Club is free of charge, however donations are appreciated.

CATASTROPHIC FIRE DANGER and SCHOOL BUSES

Balaklava Primary School, High School and BCCC are NOT high-risk sites or in a recognised bushfire prone area.

Therefore, closures based on the predicted forecast do not apply to us. This means on days of forecast catastrophic fire danger rating, our sites will remain open.

However.....

Our sites and school bus runs are located in the Mid North and YP Fire Ban District and therefore if a Catastrophic Day is declared in either district, no buses that travel through these areas will operate.





Swimming Postponed =

Usually around the middle of Term 1 each year we have our 2 week swimming program. This year saw swimming fit under the umbrella of a directive from the Department cancelling sporting activities up to week 5. The school was booked into the Owen pool for weeks 4 and 5 which because of the direction from the Department, could not take place. An opening appeared at the last minute for week 6 and we managed to rebook the program for weeks 5 and 6 of this term but the instructors that were booked last year were no longer available for either of these weeks and with such short notice we were unable to find replacement instructors. As the swimming program is a requirement and an essential part of our PE program the staff have made the decision to postpone the swimming to weeks 4 and 5 in Term 4 commencing on the 7th of November. This will still be taking place at the Owen pool and we will be bussing classes to and from the pool two at a time as took place in 2021.







Children' University 2022

Balaklava Primary School is once again offering to support students who would like to be involved in Children's University in 2022. We have been part of the program since 2019 and have seen many of our students receive recognition at the graduation ceremony which is usually held at Bonython Hall, Adelaide University in November. This is quite an experience for the students as they are given graduation caps and gowns to wear. The program is a way to acknowledge our students who take part in out of hours learning and/or volunteer their time to the community.

Extract from the Children's University website;

Nurturing successful, independent learners lies at the heart of Children's University Adelaide.

For children to develop resilience, optimism and confidence, the opportunity for self-directed learning beyond the classroom is key. Children's University Adelaide fosters wellbeing by promoting 'free range learning', encouraging children to try out new activities, discover new passions, visit new places and above all. have fun!

Dear Parents/Caregivers,

Our students have the opportunity to be involved in an exciting program: 'Children's University Australasia and Africa (IO)'. Children's University (CU) aims to encourage high quality out of school activities for children aged between 5 and 14 years, engaging the wider community as learning partners in this process. The most important principles of CU are that participation is voluntary and activities must take place outside the normal school day during lunch, after school, weekends and holidays.

Led by the University of Adelaide, CU aims to nurture aspirations and develop a love of learning. Children and young people enrolled in CU are issued with a Passport to Learning which records their individual learning journey. After the first 30 hours of learning, children are rewarded for their participation at a graduation ceremony

held at the University of Adelaide or a prestigious venue in regional areas. Children can graduate multiple times depending on the hours they accrue. Information on the hours and award levels, can be found in the Pasport to Learning.

Participating students have access to activities at school, online and also in the wider community (Learning Destinations). These activities have been validated by CU trained staff as good learning experiences. Once your child becomes a member, a full list of Learning Destinations can be found at www.cuaustralasia.com by logging on to the CU Portal*.

CU members are also able to earn 10 hours from Regular Restricted Activities. These are external organisations where students are paying members and attend regularly (e.g. sporting clubs, dance studios, swimming centres etc.). In order to earn hours, students who participate in these activities complete a 'Review' form either in the CU Portal or in hard copy issued by the CU Coordinator.

Please note that CU is not compulsory, children are encouraged to take responsibility for their learning, choosing what to do from a variety of offerings. All CU learning is designed to inspire children to think about their futures with a greater knowledge of the careers and professions that they could aspire to.

Students are enrolled in CU when they receive their Passport to Learning. The annual fee for 2022 membership is partially sponsored and will cost \$5.00 (inc. GST) per student, which includes a passport (if required). Any replacement passports will incur a fee of \$5.50 (inc GST).

If your child would like to become a member of CU for 2022 please ask your child to collect a form from the front office and complete the details. Return the form to the school via the front office by Friday 18th March along with your payment.

Premier's Reading Challenge 2022 -

What is the Challenge?

The Premier's Reading Challenge is a literacy engagement program that was introduced by the Premier in 2004 to:


- Encourage students to read more books and enjoy reading
- Improve literacy levels.

The Challenge requires students to read 12 books between the beginning of the school year and early September.

How to complete the Challenge?

To complete the Premier's Reading Challenge students need to read 12 books between week 1, term 1 and week 7 term 3.

1. Every student will need a Student Reading Record. These have been handed out to students and class teachers. Students in our JP classes often complete the challenge at school and the teacher keeps the records. If you are unsure please check with the class teacher



2. Students read 12 books. Eligible books include e-books, audio books, class/shared reading, prescribed books for school, non-fiction books, books read as research for assignments or books in another language.

3. Reception to year 6: Students must read 8 books from the Premier's Reading Challenge booklist and 4 personal choice books. In our school library eligible books have been coded with coloured stickers; red R -2, green 3-5 and yellow 6-9.

4. Students complete the Student Reading Record with the title and author for each book. The class teacher, class SSO or library staff must sign off on each book to verify it has been read.

5. Pass the completed Student Reading Record to Cherie Cleary or Ange Battle in the library by Sept 9th. You will then receive a certificate at our school assembly as an acknowledgement that you have finished the challenge.

6. Receive the official award in late November.

7. Students who complete the challenge are invited to a school celebration in term 4.

Please speak with your child's teacher if you feel your child is struggling to meet the challenge.

From the 1st of March there are 191 days to go. If students complete a book on an average of 1 every 15 days the challenge can be completed.

Clean Up Australia Day

On Friday March 18th our school will participate in the schools' Clean Up Australia Day. Each class has been allocated an area within the school or nearby, to clean up at a suitable time on Friday March 18th. We hope that participation encourages students to recognise that we all have a responsibility to help maintain and protect our environment. If we all pitch in we can make a difference. Students will bring home a note next week asking them to bring a pair of gloves, some plastic bags or buckets to carry rubbish in and perhaps a pair of tongs. Teachers will also put this note on Seesaw. Thanks for your support.



Welcome Back

Over the next few weeks, all classrooms will be looking at how our mind makes pathways and how practicing these can make these pathways stronger. We will also be covering the expectations of each lesson.

Growth Mindset -

Was drama not your strong suit when you were at school?
Many students start off a little nervous with drama as it requires us to step outside of our comfort zone and try some (sometimes)unusual things.

Our brain makes new pathways every time we try something new, but if we give up, the pathway stops being used, so for we're really working on instilling the power of 'Yet' into things we feel we aren't succeeding at... yet.

If your child comes home with a challenge they haven't yet succeeded in, tell them they haven't done it YET. It makes all the difference to those who succeed and those who give up. I will be seeking out and encouraging the effort of each of our students - so let's do it together!

Expectations .

Last year I worked extensively with department leaders of student engagement. They said for students to understand the importance of expectations, it needs to be stipulated that it's always being sought after.

It blew students minds to think that our school expectations were practice for the real world and that adults had consequences of their own when society's expectations are not met. In the next newseltter we will include the expectations at school. Perhaps quiz your children as they are leaving in the morning, or walking through the school gate, because I will be referring to them at the start of every arts and tech lesson.

This term we have been exploring biological science.

The junior classes are looking at the features of animals, particularly dinosaurs, and how scientists can make guesses about what their lives might have been like. We've already explored fossils, teeth and features of our own bodies.

Middle primary classes are extending on this to identify the features of living and non-living things. We are classifying and observing these features all over the school.

Upper primary classes have been conducting experiments and managing variables to test how different features help animals and plants survive in the desert.

Primary student use of mobile phones and personal devices

Mobile Phone Policy

Each school is required to have a mobile phone policy.

Purpose •

This policy provides direction to students. staff and families about mobile managing phones and other diaital devices that students choose to bring to school. Digital devices include, limited are not to. smartwatches. tablets



or laptops that are not part of a separate Bring Your Own Device arrangement. This policy applies while students are at school, or attending an authorised school activity such as an excursion, during school hours and on school buses.

Mobile phone use for primary school students

The department's position is that primary aged students cannot use their mobile phones and personal devices at school during school hours. The department and the school recognise that there are legitimate reasons for students to bring a mobile phone or personal device to school. This may include:

- to ensure their safety while travelling
- so that parents can contact them outside of school hours.

During the school day students are not permitted to access or use their mobile phones or other personal devices. Students must switch off or mute their devices before storing them at the beginning of the school day. They will not be able to access their device until the end of the school day.

Storage of personal devices -

Students will switch their device off or to silent and hand into the front office staff between 8:25am and 8:45am.

The staff member who receives the device, will put it into a labelled bag and it will be securely stored until the child collects their device at the end of the school day (3:10pm).

No electronic devices to be stored in classrooms, school bags or with the student.

If the student does not comply -

If a student does not hand in their mobile phone at the beginning of the day, it will be confiscated by a teacher or leadership and stored in the office until 3:10 (the end of the school day). At this time, the student may collect the device from the office. A message will be sent to parent/cargiver to inform them.

Student will be given a rethink.

Subsequent breaches of this will result in the device being confiscated and stored in the office until a parent / caregiver can collect the device from school. Student will be given a rethink.

Governing Council

The Governing Council (GC) is an elected group of parents and staff that oversee the management and well-being of the school community and its assets. Members of Council are elected at the Annual General Meeting and usually serve a two-year term. The tasks of GC include:

- Keeping informed about the Site Learning Plan
- Advising the Principal of general community concerns and opinions
- Discussing educational policy
- Liaison with staff

The Governing Council meet in the evenings, twice per term.

Sub Committees have been formed to help share the responsibilities and decision-making with a greater number of parents who are not members of the GC. Usually, one member of each committee is also a member of GC. They then report back to the GC with any recommendations made by the committee, for the GC to vote on if necessary.

Please join the Governing Council AGM on Tuesday 15th March to hear more, ask questions or join any of these committees. A nomination form can be found in this newsletter. We would love to see some new faces join our committees. If you have any questions prior to the meeting, please do not hesitate to contact the school, or speak with Dianna, Diane, Kirstyn Rundle (Chair) or Lauren March (Secretary).

Sub committees include:

Fundraising:

Meets on a regular basis throughout the year to initiate, implement and support various fundraising activities throughout the year. These are usually day time meetings

Finance:

Manages the school finances in consultation with the school community by developing an annual budget and monitoring expenditure and income throughout the year.

The Finance Committee meet twice per term, usually in the early evening, however the members of the committee will discuss their availability to determine a suitable meeting time in 2022.

Canteen:

Representatives from the Primary School meet with representatives from the High School to oversee the management of the canteen, usually once per term. This is often an after school meeting.

Bus:

Review of bus routes, manages the bus policies and responds to other issues concerning the school buses as they arise. This committee meets once per term, at approximately 4pm.

Grounds and Facilities:

The general maintenance of the school grounds and buildings, including organising working bees and ensuring the school maintenance schedule is adhered to. This committee meet twice per term, usually around 5:30pm.

The Parent Coordinating Committee (PCC) are a group that promotes a closer relationship between school and home by:

- Holding open parent meetings twice a term which includes a report from Leadership with a current up date regarding the school.
- Offering general information to parents
- Providing a morning tea to welcome new families to the school on the first morning of the year (covid dependent)
- Organising class representatives
- Presenting graduation gifts to the year 6 students at the end of the year
- Overseeing the sale of second-hand uniforms
- Raising any issues of concern or suggestions and taking them to Governing Council
- Providing assistance at Sports events, school photo day and other school events or activities as negotiated with staff.

PCC meetings are held during the day. As we are child friendly, we welcome younger children to our meetings.

ALLERGY AWARE SCHOOL



Nut and Seed (Allergy) Aware School

We ask that **ALL** students at BPS refrain from bringing foods to school that contain nuts (eg Peanut paste / Nutella) as well as Sesame and Linseed seed.

We appreciate your cooperation with this Thank you - Dianna

A severe allergy to nuts and sesame can have a life threatening reaction. Anaphylactic shock can occur within seconds of exposure to a nut or sesame allergen.

This can occur if:

- Contact is made with a person who has handled or eaten nuts or nut products.
- Contact is made with a person who has handled or eaten sesame seeds or sesame products.
- Contact is made with an object such as a toy or door handle that has traces of nuts or sesame on it.

Context

The DfE requires schools to promote and construct learning environments that are safe and supportive.

Students and staff may have Anaphylaxis, the severest form of allergic reaction, and nuts or nut products may be a trigger. This means that exposure at school may constitute a risk to their health and well-being. It is not possible to guarantee that the environment will be completely free of potential hazards, however, compliance to reasonable guidelines will minimize the potential risks.

Purpose

To provide a safe learning environment for all members of the Balaklava Primary School community.

To raise the awareness of all members of the community regarding severe allergies.

Management

The Nut and Sesame Aware policy will be managed by:

- Parents, caregivers and community members being requested NOT to send food to school that contain any nuts (especially peanuts). This includes Peanut Paste, Nutella, nougat, all nuts and cooking oil containing peanut oil, as well as foods containing nuts.
- Parents, caregivers and community members being requested NOT to send food to school that contain any sesame seeds or sesame oil. This includes bread with sesame seeds on top, hummus and foods cooked in sesame oil
- Staff supervising eating at lunch time.
- Students being encouraged NOT to share food
- Students being encouraged to wash hands after eating.
- Staff participating in First Aid Training, understanding and dealing with Anaphylaxis (severe allergic reactions) as the need arises.
- Students washing hands and face before leaving for school in the case where they have eaten nut or sesame products for breakfast.
- Staff complying with the Nut and Sesame Awareness policy when cooking with students at school.
- * This school acknowledges that due to food processing practices it is impractical to eliminate nuts and nut products entirely from an environment where there is food. The emphasis is therefore on raising awareness and adopting the reasonable procedures termed as 'Nut and Sesame Awareness'.







ATTENDANCE

Regular attendance at school is crucial. It is a requirement that children attend the school at which they are enrolled in, every day the school is open and at all school activities the school requires the child to attend.

Parents have a responsibility under the Act to ensure their children attend school regularly. If a child or young person does not attend, without a 'prescribed reason' for their non-attendance or an approved exemption, their parents may be guilty of an offence.

It is vital that you communicate with us if your child is absent from school for any reason. You may notify us via phone, text, Skoolbag, Seesaw or diary note. If you know about an absence in advance, please communicate with the classroom teacher or use one of the methods above.

If your child is absent and we do not have an explanation, you will receive an automated text from the school. Please respond with a reason why your child is absent. In the case that your child is ill, we ask that you inform us of their illness (some illnesses are notifiable to the school community) and ask you to keep them home for at least 24 Hours (48 hours preferably) after their last symptom. This helps to halt the spread of illnesses throughout the school.

If planning a family holiday or similar within a school term which will see your child away for a week or more, please see Admin staff for an exemption form. This is a requirement and must be approved by the Principal prior to the holiday.

If a student arrives at school late (after the 8:45am bell) the child needs to sign in at the Front Office. The child will be required to give the classroom teacher the printed slip they receive when they sign in.

Children departing early must be signed out at the office. Our front office staff can assist with this.

If you are having difficulty getting your child to school, please speak with the classroom teacher, Cherie, Kym or myself so that we can assist.
