From the Principal



Restorative Journey's

Last Friday, Kerrie Sellen from Restorative Journey's delivered a thought provoking and powerful training and development session for staff. Kerrie challenged us to unpack what restorative practices look like and how to continue to implement the framework as part of our Engagement and Wellbeing strategies. The framework guides our practice to be explicit and fair, whilst developing accountability and self-awareness. The main elements of the framework are:

- Respect distinguishing behaviour from the person
- Fair engaging, with explanations and clarification of expectations
- Restorative by repairing harm and building relationships

We look forward to continuing to work with Kerrie, having booked her to return next term for further staff training, student coaching workshops. and parent Information about the parent workshops will be shared with families next term.



Face Masks

We strongly recommend that all visitors wear face masks while on site at Balaklava Primary School.



Thank you for your continued support to ensure that students do not attend school when unwell. We request that students stay away for 24 hours after their last symptom but strongly encourage staying away from school for 48 hours after their last symptom to ensure they are fully recovered.



Please ensure you continue to notify the school when your child is unwell. This can be done via Skoolbag, SeeSaw, written communication (eg diary) or a phone call to the office.

If you child is absent for three days or more due to an illness (not related to Covid) we require a medical certificate.



Assembly

With current Covid safe settings, we can accommodate 40 community members attending assemblies in the Well. A link to the form to request one Community Assembly ticket per student will be sent out via Skoolbag at the beginning of Week 8. Please ensure you follow this process in order to register your interest to attend the assembly. We will allocate tickets based on the responses and text you if you have secured a ticket. At the Week 8 Assembly, preference will be given to one family member per School Leader (as badges will be handed out) and well as one family member per student who is hosting or presenting.

No Parking

While we understand that it is not always easy to find a car park for morning drop off and pick up, we do need to remind families that **NO** there is no parking along



the stretch of Wallace Street between our bus road and the crossing between 8:15am – 9:15am and 3pm – 4pm. When cars are parked along this stretch of road, the visibility for our crossing monitors is reduced.



Instead, if you are wanting to park on Wallace Street, please park to the North of the School Crossing (High School and Swimming Pool side of the road) or in the Swimming Pool Car Park.

Uniform

The rain certainly has been a welcome relief, but along with the rain, we have had some cold mornings. I have noticed that some of our students are wearing non uniform winter clothing. Students are expected to wear a maroon school polo. At times, the warmth of the classrooms mean that students do not want to wear a thick jumper but it is too cold to wear only a polo. For these circumstances, students are allowed to wear a black long sleeve shirt under their polo. Colours other than black under the school polo are not accepted, nor are hoodies.

Jumpers:

We expect all students to wear a maroon jumper. We do have some pre-loved jumpers available from School. Please call into the office or give us a call to check on size availability.

Pants:

We expect students to wear black or school grey with no large logos / stripes. Leggings are not part of our uniform unless under a skirt, skort, kilt etc.

I do understand that on the odd occasion, you may be caught unable to dry your child's uniform and thus they come to school in non-uniform clothing. If this is the case, please notify the office or your child's teacher. If you need any support obtaining a school uniform, please do not hesitate to contact me.



If you have any uniform items that no longer fit your child, we would appreciate you donating them back to the school.


New blinds were installed last Friday around the Room 6 & 7 Verandah, making this a wonderful outdoor learning space suitable for all weather conditions!

PHONES AND PERSONAL DEVICES

Mobile Phone Policy:

Each school is required to have a mobile phone policy implemented by the end of this term. Staff and students have been working on our policy, particularly in regards to the storage of devices and the consequences for non-compliance. Governing Council have had an opportunity to view the policy and will provide feedback at



their next meeting. I have included basic information from the policy below. If you would like to view the full policy please email dl.0477.info@schools.sa.edu.au and we will send you a copy. All feedback on this draft policy will need to be received by the school no later than Friday 18th June.

Purpose

This policy provides direction to students, staff and families about managing mobile phones and other digital devices that students choose to bring to school. Digital devices include, but are not limited to, smartwatches, tablets or laptops that are not part of a separate Bring Your Own Device arrangement. This policy applies while students are at school, or attending an authorised school activity such as an excursion, during school hours and on school buses.

Mobile phone use for primary school students

The department's position is that primary aged students cannot use their mobile phones and personal devices at school during school hours. The department and the school recognise that there are legitimate reasons for students to bring a mobile phone or personal device to school. This may include:

- to ensure their safety while travelling
- so that parents can contact them outside of school hours.

During the school day students are not permitted to access or use their mobile phones or other personal devices. Students must switch off or mute their devices before



storing them at the beginning of the school day. They will not be able to access their device until the end of the school day.

Storage of personal devices

Students will switch their device off or to silent and hand into the front office staff between 8:25am and 8:45am.

The staff member who receives the device, will put it into a labelled bag and it will be securely stored until the child collects their device at the end of the school day (3:10pm).

No electronic devices to be stored in classrooms, school bags or with the student.

If the student does not comply

If a student does not hand in their mobile phone at the beginning of the day, it will be confiscated by a teacher or leadership and stored in the office until 3:10 (the end of the school day). At this time, the student may collect the device from the office. A message will be sent to parent/cargiver to inform them.

Student will be given a rethink.

Subsequent breaches of this will result in the device being confiscated and stored in the office until a parent / caregiver can collect the device from school. Student will be given a rethink.

Further information regarding the use of mobile phones and personal devices on school buses will be communicated soon.

YEAR 3/4 HISTORY VISIT TO CENTENARY HALL

Last week as part of our history studies the Year 3/4 students took an interesting tour through Centenary Hall and its outlying sheds. Our thanks go to Mrs Schopp and Mr Zerk who explained different displays to us.

In the hall we viewed some beautiful bridal gowns worn through the ages, including a black gown. There were lots of old clocks, photographs of previous Balaklava buildings such as the old flour mill and Kaurna aboriginal artefacts.

Mr Zerk explained how a woomera was used to project a spear. We went inside the room full of household items. Hot water bottles, early fridges and washing machines with wringers, butter churns, wash stands with jug and bowl sets, old steam and coal irons, old cots and an old wooden stove appealed to the students. In the outside buildings we saw old toys, a school room, the Traeger pedal radio and a medical room. In the toy room we saw games such as knuckles, quoits and old metal tricycles. The workings of Alf Traeger's pedal radio were explained. We marvelled at how clever he was.

In the Medical room, the old metal bed was very narrow and looked uncomfortable. A long desk in the school room was huge and had six ink wells embedded in it. We saw slates, old maps, quills and old books. This opportunity provided the students with an insight about how much has changed over time, particularly in the technology field. We all had a great time and look forward to future visits. We were all having so much fun that we forgot to take some photos!

COMMUNITY GARDEN ACTIVITY





MID-YEAR INTAKE -INFORMATION FOR PARENTS



We are introducing a mid-year intake into preschool from 2023 and for school (reception) from 2024.

STARTING PRESCHOOL

From 2023 children who turn 4 years old:

- before 1 May continue to start preschool at the beginning of the year
- from 1 May to 31 October start preschool through the mid-year intake at the start of term 3 of that year
- after 31 October start preschool at the beginning of the following year.

Children will undertake 4 terms (1 year) of preschool, regardless of whether they start at the beginning of the year, or through a mid-year intake.

Further information about how to submit registration of interest for mid-year entry to preschool will be available soon.

STARTING SCHOOL

From 2024 children who turn 5 years old:

- before 1 May can start primary school (the first year is known as reception) at the beginning of the year
- from 1 May to 31 October start school through the mid-year intake at the start of term 3 of that year
- after 31 October start school at the beginning of the following year.

Students who start school at the beginning of the year will complete 4 terms of reception.

Students who start school through a mid-year intake (start of term 3) will complete 6 terms of reception.

CHILDREN WITH DISABILITY OR ADDITIONAL NEEDS

If you have a child with disability or additional needs, talk to the principal or preschool director about the starting time that best suits your child's needs.

AFL SPORTING SCHOOL

If you have already paid the 2022 Materials and Services Charge, your school will contact you shortly with information on how you can ask for a refund, or how a rebate can be applied to other outstanding charges (such as excursions or school camps).

If you haven't yet paid the charge for 2022, your school will automatically apply a \$100 discount to the amount owing.

The discount does not apply to families who have been approved for school card as they are not required to pay a materials and services charge.

We hope that this extra support will make things a little bit easier.

BOOK REVIEW

Title: The Tattooist of Auschwitz

Author: Heather Morris


Brief summary: The Tattooist of Auschwitz is based on the true story of Lale and Gita Sokolov, two Slovakian Jews. The book is based on Lale and Gita's lives when they are deprived of their freedom, their dignity, their families and even their names when they are forced into the Auschwitz concentration camp in 1942. The camp members are stripped of their belongings, their family and names and given symbols and numbers to represent them. Before the concentration camp they lived an extraordinary life, until they are forced into slavery and unexplainable camp conditions which lead to sickness and even death. With life so horrid and vivid, the love between Lale and Gita aids with survival.

I rate this book: 4 out of 5 stars

I recommend this book to others as it defines the history of fairness in some people's lives and demonstrates the determination of others to just survive life even through horrific times. The book is vivid, harrowing and highlights hope through the re-creation of Lale Sokolov's experiences as the man who tattooed the arms of thousands of prisoners. These tattoos are now known as a symbolic image representing the Holocaust.
