Balaklava Primary School is a proud public school with a long history of serving the Balaklava township and surrounding areas. We manage a fleet of 11 buses and students come from areas as far afield as Lochiel and Port Parham. Our school is set in beautiful, well-kept grounds, shares a boundary with Balaklava High School and is within a short walking distance of the Balaklava Community Children's Centre and Out of School Hours Care (OSHC).

Balaklava Primary has a strong focus on developing the whole child. In addition to strong literacy and numeracy programs we offer specialist lessons in digital technologies, French, Science and Arts.

Mutual Respect; Tolerance; Success; Fair Treatment; Cooperation; Responsibility and Honesty are reflected in all areas of our school community and our motto Believe, Participate, Succeed encapsulates our attitude to learning and life.

Public transport access:

The principal of the primary school manages 11 buses. All Buses have been subcontracted. The buses provide transport for over 600 students to the pre-school, primary, non-government and high school sites daily.

Special site arrangements:

We share the use of the High School's canteen (lunch orders) and their gym, for sporting activites such as implementing Sporting Schools grants. Balakava Community Childrens Centre run the Out of School Hours Care program. Students are transported via bus to and from OSHC.

4. Curriculum

Subject offerings:

We aim to provide a broad and balanced learning experience for all students as outlined in the Australian Curriculum developed and revised by ACARA. Subject include: English, Mathematics, Science, Health & Physical Education (H&PE), The Arts, Technologies, History and Social Sciences (HASS), French (LOTE)

Specialist subjects are Arts, Digital Technologies, Science and French.

• Open Access/Distance Education provision:

Special needs:

Students with Special Needs are catered for within the classroom setting by class teachers and dedicated SSOs

We run a Disability Unit for our local catchment area. Enrolment offers are managed through Support Services, Gawler Education Office.

Special curriculum features:

Instrumental music is available for students. The school choir performs at the Primary Schools Music Festival and the local events eg Balaklava Eisteddfod. We also have a School Band, Instrumental and vocal Ensemble.

Teaching methodology:

Sharing of pedagogic practices occurs between teachers. There is an ongoing expectation of pedagogic adjustments to meet student needs and ensure all students can achieve their optimum level of learning. We use the Department for Education Best Advice and Literacy and Numeracy Guide Books for School Improvement. The Guide books provide evidence-based literacy and numeracy practices to improve student growth and achievement. They give specific ideas and actions for leaders and teachers to improve practice in the classroom and support children at all levels.

Our Early Years staff work closely with the DfE Literacy Guarantee Unit to develop our phonics teaching sequence. We have adopted the departments Reception to year 2 phonics and spelling scope and sequence. Teachers use a systematic synthetic approach providing students multiple opportunities to review and practice their phonics learing.

All staff teach Big Ideas in Number as part of their daily Numeracy lessons.

Student assessment procedures and reporting

Written reports at the end of Terms 2 and 4.

Joint programmes

As part of the Lower Mid North Partnership, leaders meet at least twice a term Schools within the Lower Mid North partnership are involved in joint professional development activities, pupil free days and PLCs throughout the year.

Balaklava Primary work closely with Balaklava Community Children's Centre and Balaklava High School for transition programs

Balaklava Primary School are involved in community events such as the Balaklava Eisteddfod, Local Christmas Parade, Remembrance and Anzac Day ceremonies, Choir events etc.

5. Sporting Activities

Swimming lessons are conducted during term time at the Balaklava Swimming Pool – R-5 in Term 1. Year 6 students attend an aquatic camp.

We run an annual School Swimming Carnival

Participation in SAPSASA is encouraged for a range of sports such as: netball, football, softball, cricket, golf, soccer, tennis, basketball, hockey.

The school undertakes a variety of Sporting School Coaching clinics. Recent offerings have included: orienteering, gymnastics, basketball, tennis, hockey, touch football.

School Sports Day is usually held in term 1 or term 3 with student being selected from this to participate in the interschool sports day. Students may get the opportunity to then compete in Adelaide.

6. Other Co-Curricular Activities

Religious Education seminars are held by local church groups at least twice a year. •

Camps are held annually for students in Year 4-6.



Visiting performances add value to our educational programs. A performance levy is part of the school fees. We have at minimum 4 performances per year.

A Dance program run by an external agency (such as Footsteps or Dancify) biannually.

BPS is a Way to Go School and thus we undertake Bike Ed – Year 5/6 every two years.

• Staff utilisation policies

All classes have access to 10 lessons of Student Support time per week to support Literacy / Numeracy programs.

Students with Additional funding have SSO time above the 10 lessons of classroom support.

Access to special staff

DfE services – speech pathology, psychology, social work, behaviour management, interoception, hearing impairment, and special education – are accessed as required.

An Instrumental Music Service is offered once per week as well as Private Music lessons.

Access to bus transport

School buses use a road within school grounds for drop off and collection of students each morning and afternoon.

11 buses are managed by Balaklava Primary School. These buses pick students up from areas such as: Halbury, Hoyleton, Bowmans, Nantawarra, Lochiel, Avon, Wild Hore Plains, Dublin, Thompson's Beach, Port Parham, Mallala Redbanks, Mallala, Owen etc. A bus policy exists with the Partnership.

Bus transport is available to and from the BCCC OSHC service.

A bus company is able to offer affordable transport for excursions and camps, and is our preferred supplier. Other bus companies are also available to provide quotes and transport.



10. School Operations

Decision making structures

Leadership, PAC, Administration, Staff meetings, Student Representative Council (SRC) and Governing Council, including Parent Coordinating Committee, Finance Committee, Grounds Committee, Bus Committee, Canteen Committee.

All committees make decisions using a consensus approach.

Formal decision making bodies are: Staff Meetings, Governing Council, Finance Advisory Committee and the Personnel Advisor Committee.

School Captains meet regularly and have a genuine role in supporting and informing school improvement.

We have approximately 3.34 hectares with the Balaklava High School sharing one boundary fence, the Balaklava Community Children's Centre several blocks away and the Horizon Christian School across the road

We welcome parent and community involvement and actively support local initiatives such as tree planting, Balaklava Agricultural Show, Balaklava Eisteddfod and other opportunities as they arise
