BOB (Be Our Best) -

BPS very own Social and Emotional Whole School Program, starts this week (Week 3) explicitly teaching The Keeping Safe: Child Protection Curriculum and You Can Do It program and (What's the Buzz - Archie for Rec/Year 1 and Room 8). This social and emotional program has been developed after researching best practice and listening to parents/ carers, students and staff about what social skills and knowledge our students require further support with. This program aims to develop prosocial (getting along) behaviours and provide students with a range of strategies to support them at school and when in the community.

The Keeping Safe: Child Protection Curriculum (KS:CPC) is a respectful relationships and child safety curriculum for children and young people from age 3 to year 12. It teaches children to: recognise abuse and tell a trusted adult about it, understand what is appropriate and inappropriate touching and understand ways of keeping themselves safe.

The KS:CPC is mandated in all public preschools and schools and is taught every year by classroom teachers. It is a world-class, evidence-based child safety program.



Balaklava Primary School has been associated with Children's University for 4 years and is continuing to run the program in 2023.

An excerpt from the CUA website

"Children's University Australasia provides students with exciting, free-range learning activities outside the day-to-day schoolwork, whether that be before school, lunch time, after school, or in the school holidays. The best part about Children's University is that it's voluntary, so students get to choose what activities they would like to do, where, when and how they would like to do them. The things they learn about will always be able to be connected to something that they could study at a university.

Children's University Learning Destinations (the fun places you go to learn fun things) all have a Children's University Learning Destination sticker in the window. Students take their Passport to Learning with them, and once they have participated in the activity, they get a stamp for the time spent learning. The more activities students do, the more hours and stamps they will get in your Passport to Learning, and the closer to graduating.

Once students have collected enough hours, they will graduate in an iconic location where they will be presented with a certificate at a special ceremony, all dressed up in a cap and gown, just like the older university students."


SRC Members



This teaching is done orally.



Year 6 Aquatics Camp

Below is a packing list of items your child requires for the camp. It would be helpful if bedding gear is rolled and packed, and other items are in an overnight bag or similar. It is a good idea to pack a couple of plastic bags to put wet/dirty clothes in to come home.


