Illness

It is the time of year that colds, flu and bugs such as gastro do the rounds. It is extremely important that we minimise




the spread of any of these illnesses. The best way to stop the spread is to ensure that your child does not attend school when unwell. **Students must stay home for 24 hours** after their last symptom, however, to ensure you child is completely recovered, we do strongly encourage you to keep your child home for **48 hours** after their last symptom. It takes everyone doing the right thing to ensure we can limit the impact for all students and staff.

Tier 1 Support

Last fortnight we shared some information about positive Behaviour of Learning and included our Tier 1 site wide strategy, Hat Expectation. Today we have included our Eating Expectation as well as our Behaviour Education Poster (more details below).



The Behaviour Education poster on page 4 has been created by our staff to explicitly teach our students about what Calm and Ready to Learn Behaviours look like in our classrooms and yard. We ackowledge that not all behaviours can be listed on our poster, however, it creates a scaffold for conversations with students. Students may sometimes display behaviours from all three sections of the circle however our aim is to create environments that are safe and for students and productive for learning. If a student requires support to get back into the Calm and Ready to Learn space, we will teach our students ways they can regulate or knowing when they may need an adult to help co-regulate with them.

Laminated A3 posters are displayed in all of our classrooms and our staff will continue to explicitly teach these skills using this poster, using some of the strategies from the poster.

Teachers may help students create a 'calm card' for when they are not ready to learn. Student write down 4 strategies (use 3 before me) they could use to help them get back into the Calm and Ready to Learn space. If they need to use their calm card, the student tries three strategies and if they are still not ready then encourage them to seek out an adult or use the Engine Room for support and help to co-regulate using interception activities. Calm Cards help students to identify their own unique coping strategies, and they help students to remember and to practice these coping skills. The cards provide a sense of power and ownership over the worry, and provide some early independence for young children.

- Teachers will explicitly teach or role-play with students what each section of the poster looks like and what the support for students at BPS will look like.
- Teachers may use social stories/narratives.
- Teachers may exlicitly teach students about feelings using visuals pictures/emojis having students identify where they sit on the poster.
- Teachers may use a positive behaviour, as a focus for each day to catch students displaying Calm and Ready to Learn behaviours.

'All in all, positive behaviour support strategies create positive learning environments in classrooms, whilst directly teaching and acknowledging prosocial behaviours. This does not just help classrooms, it helps societies' (<u>https://www.monash.edu/education/teachspace/articles/five-ways-to-use-positive-behaviour-support-strategies-in-your-classroom).</u>

Balaklava Primary School now has an Aboriginal Community Education Officer (ACEO). My name is Julie McNamara. I've only recently (2 weeks ago) gained employment with Balaklava Primary School, after starting at the High School earlier this term. I will continue to work closely with Vivienne and our First Nation students, their families and our school community on culture.

A little bit of background information about myself. My Country is Yuin, on the South Coast of New South Wales. Yuin Nation stretches from Eden right up almost to Wollongong. My mobs are Budawang and Murramarang, which traditional lands were around the coast near Batemans Bay area.



I have only recently, (recently being the last 15-20 years)

discovered my Aboriginal heritage. I continue to learn about my culture and traditions of my people and would welcome to learn about each of yours, if you'd like to share this with me. I began working in Aboriginal Education in 2019 as an Aboriginal Community Education officer (ACEO) with Craigmore South PS, then went on to work at Playford Primary School and I am looking forward to now be working at Balaklava Primary School whilst currently studying Community Development.

I am very excited to be working here and I am looking forward to meeting my new school community. I am passionate about the inclusivity of the indigenous culture in the curriculum and the everyday classroom.

Grapheme Audits

Throughout the year the student's will have assessments on their knowledge of phonemes and graphemes. The testing will vary in different year levels. Included in the newsletter are some examples of some testing that may occur, remember every student is on their own learning journey and therefore testing may differ for different children according to their academic progress. Initially we are testing the name and sound of each letter and this progresses into assessing combinations of letters to make sounds like 'ch' and 'igh'.

During spelling lessons, we follow a specific scope and sequence to teach the graphemes to the students in a particular order. After testing, if students don't know the graphemes, they may be revisited by the whole class, or your child may have some extra help from an SSO in the form of an intervention group.

At times throughout the year, you may see information from teachers regarding your child's progress with graphemes. This should indicate the progress they are making as the year progresses and you are also able to support your child at home if you wish. There is a copy of the scope and sequence on the wall in the library if you wish to have a look. Students in Junior Primary have been learning about algorithms and ways to build items without requiring tape. This has been challenging some students with their fine motor skills, but watching their progress has been awesome. Here is Room 7 with their trees that they made using glue, scissors, paper and tissue paper. The shape they used to build their tree is called a flange.



In the Arts, students are learning about dynamics – dy-nam-ics (3 syllables) and how it refers to loud and soft sounds. Students have been also learning how to keep the beat. By combining the two, junior classes have been working towards playing in time to the beat whilst incorporating dynamics to the song 'Forte – Piano' which is Italian for LOUD and soft.

Ber 4 Art Work


Ber 4 students have made some art pieces using their hands.



August 19th – 25th Term 3 Week 5


Theme for 2023 - "Read, Grow, Inspire"




puppets, etc. work and how they were made.

CHARACTER STRENGTHS


There are several ways for us to gain knowledge and feel well. Building relationships, engaging in acts of kindness, and practising mindfulness are just a few ways to feel wellbeing. But did you know that identifying your own character strengths might lead to a long-term strategy for improving wellbeing? According to research, discovering and using your character strengths on a daily basis can enhance your welfare and quality of life.

In order for us to grow and prosper, it is crucial that we get the chance to discover our individual abilities. There are 24 universal character strengths that have been identified through positive psychology, which we all possess to some extent. Positive aspects of our personalities, such as our character strengths, can support us in cultivating higher levels of wellbeing and happiness. Each of us naturally expresses some character traits more easily than others, which gives us each a distinct personality. Classes have spent part of their BOB (Be Our Best - Social and Emotional Program) investigating and learning about their top three character strengths and the strengths their peers see in them.


